OPPORTUNITIES TO SHEPHERD THEM

Challenge #1: Empowerment without Wisdom

Kids today are empowered with resources, thanks to smart devices, but many lack the maturity to wisely use that power. Common sense is becoming uncommon in our smart world.

Shepherding Opportunity:
How do we lead our kids to explore a world beyond screens and theories and lead them with first-hand experiences?
Challenge #2: Stimulation without Ownership
Kids today spend more time in supervised activity than ever before with little opportunity to take ownership of their activity. This creates feelings of anxiety and unpreparedness.
Shepherding Opportunity:
How do we lead our kids to participate in ownership of their actions and activities as they mature?

Challenge #3: Privileges without Responsibility

Culture has ambushed kids, giving them a sense of entitlement to so many benefits that people once worked for and earned through responsible action.

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Challenge #4: Involvement without Boundaries	
Kids enjoy options everywhere, but with those options come anxiety because they can beco- overwhelmed by all that is available to them with seemingly no boundaries.	ne

How do we lead our kids to understand the need for and how to establish healthy boundaries	s?
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Challenge #5: Individualism without Perspective

Kids long to be their own person as they mature but will simply react to the shifting world around them without a clear understanding of where they belong in the world.

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How do we lead our kids to understand their identity in Christ and their place in God's bigger story?
Challenge #6: Accessibility without Accountability
So much is accessible to kids but with reduced accountability for their actions, ethics and values and a lower expectation of them by adult leaders.
Shepherding Opportunity:
How do we lead our kids to understand the importance of accountability and responsibility and to embrace it in their lives?

Challenge #7: Fluidity without Integrity

Kids live in a world of constant updates and upgrades. Nothing stays the same, and as a result they can lack a firm foundation and sense of security.

Shepherding Opportunity:
How do we lead our kids to understand the foundation that their lives should be built on and where their security comes from?
Challenge #8: Opportunity without Resilience
With so many options, kids can hop rapidly from one opportunity to another when their current opportunities become difficult and, as a result, fail to develop "grit" or the ability to adapt and recover from mistakes and failures.
Shepherding Opportunity:
How do we lead our kids to deal with hardship and learn qualities of determination and perseverance?

Challenge #9: Consumption without Reflection

Kids are growing up in a world that is wide but seldom deep. They can be consumers of everything yet remain superficial because they haven't been taught to critically reflect on what they consume.
